

Statement of Safeguarding Principles

Every person has a value and dignity which comes directly from the creation of humans in God's own image and likeness. Christians see this potential as fulfilled by God's re-creation of us in Christ. Among other things this implies a duty to value all people as bearing the image of God and therefore to protect them from harm.

Principles

We are committed to:

- The care and nurture of, and respectful pastoral ministry with, all children, young people and adults
- The safeguarding and protection of all children, young people and adults when they are vulnerable
- The establishing of safe, caring communities which provide a loving environment where there is informed vigilance as to the dangers of abuse

We will carefully select and train all those with any responsibility within the Church, in line with Safer Recruitment principles, including the use of criminal records disclosures and registration with the relevant vetting and barring schemes.

We will respond without delay to every complaint made which suggests that a child, young person or adult may have been harmed, cooperating with the police and local authority in any investigation.

We will seek to work with anyone who has suffered abuse, developing with them an appropriate ministry of informed pastoral care.

We will seek to challenge any abuse of power, especially by anyone in a position of trust.

We will seek to offer pastoral care and support, including supervision and referral to the proper authorities, to any member of our church community known to have offended against a child, young person or vulnerable adult.

In all these principles we will follow legislation, guidance and recognised good practice.

Safeguarding Children and Vulnerable Adults Policy for Roundhay Methodist Church

This policy was agreed at a Church Council held 4th December 2017

The Methodist Church, along with the whole Christian community, believes each person has a value and dignity which comes directly from God's creation in God's own image and likeness. Christians see this as fulfilled by God's re-creation of us in Christ. Among other things, this implies a duty to value all people as bearing the image of God and therefore to protect them from harm.

Roundhay Methodist Church is committed to the safeguarding and protection of all children, young people and vulnerable adults and affirms that the needs of children, or of people when they are vulnerable and at risk are paramount.

Roundhay Methodist Church recognizes that it has a particular care for all who are vulnerable whether by disabilities or by reduction in capacities or by their situation. It is recognized that this increased vulnerability may be temporary or permanent and may be visible or invisible, but that it does not diminish our humanity and seeks to affirm the gifts and graces of all God's people.

This policy addresses the safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults. It is intended to be a dynamic policy. It is intended to support the Church in being a safe, supportive and caring community for children, young people, vulnerable adults, for survivors of abuse, for communities and for those affected by abuse.

Roundhay Methodist Church fully agrees with the Connexional statement reiterated in Creating Safer Space 2007.

As the people of the Methodist Church we are concerned with the wholeness of each individual within God's purpose for everyone. We seek to safeguard all members of the church community of all ages.

Roundhay Methodist Church recognizes the serious issue of the abuse of children and vulnerable adults and recognizes that this may take the form of physical, emotional, sexual, financial, spiritual, discriminatory, domestic or institutional abuse or neglect, abuse using social media or human trafficking (slavery). It acknowledges the effects these may have on people and their development including spiritual and religious development, it accepts its responsibility for ensuring that all people are safe in its care and that their dignity and right to be heard is maintained. It accepts its responsibility to support, listen to and work for healing with survivors, offenders, communities and those who care about them. It takes seriously the issues of promotion of welfare so that each of us can reach our full potential in God's grace.

Roundhay Methodist Church commits itself to respond without delay to any allegation or cause for concern that a child or vulnerable adult may have been harmed, whether in the church or in another context. It commits itself to challenge the abuse of power of anyone in a position of trust.

Roundhay Methodist Church commits itself to ensuring the implementation of Connexional Safeguarding Policy; government legislation and guidance and safe practice in the circuit and in the churches.

Roundhay Methodist Church commits itself to the provision of support, advice and training for lay and ordained people that will ensure people are clear and confident about their roles and responsibilities in safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and adults who may be vulnerable.

Roundhay Methodist Church affirms and gives thanks for those who work with children and vulnerable adults and also acknowledge the shared responsibility of all of us for safeguarding vulnerable adults who are on our premises.

Roundhay Methodist Church appoints Anne Kirkland as Church Safeguarding Adults Representative and as Church Safeguarding Children Coordinator and supports her in that role which is to:

1. Support and advise the minister and the stewards in fulfilling their roles
2. Provide a point of reference to advise on safeguarding issues
3. Liaise with Circuit and District Safeguarding Officers
4. Promote safeguarding best practice within the local church with the support of circuit ministers
5. Ensure proper records are kept of all incidents/concerns according to Methodist policy and practice
6. Ensure that all safeguarding training which is required is undertaken by those in post and appropriate records kept and made available
7. Attend training and meetings organized to support the role
8. Oversee safeguarding throughout the whole life of the Church e.g. lettings, groups, property etc.
9. Report to the Church council annually
10. Ensure the church completes a yearly audit/monitoring on safeguarding confirming that policies are in place for the church and all groups and lettings in the Church and that these have been annually reviewed
11. Ensure the church completes a risk assessment on each area of activity in the church and this is stored and reviewed at least annually. This should be made available if asked for.
12. Ensure that the church recruits safely for all posts.
13. Ensure that the church has a safeguarding notice board with a copy of the current, signed safeguarding policy, contact numbers for local and national helplines and other suitable information

a) Purpose

The purpose of this safeguarding policy is to ensure procedures are in place and people are clear about roles and responsibilities for vulnerable adults in our care and using our premises. It is to be read in conjunction with the *Safeguarding Policy, Procedures and Guidance for the Methodist Church (2017)*.

b) Good Practice

We believe good practice means that:

- 1 All people are treated with respect and dignity.
- 2 Those who act on behalf of the Church should not meet or work alone with a child or vulnerable adult where the activity cannot be seen, unless this is necessary for pastoral reasons, in which case a written note of this will be made and kept noting date, time and place of visit.
- 3 The Church premises will be assessed for safety for children and vulnerable adults and the risk assessment report will be given annually to the Church Council in written form. This will include fire safety procedures. The Church Council will consider the extent to which the premises and equipment are suitable or should be made more suitable.
- 4 Those who work with children, young people or vulnerable adults or who are in a position of trust or office holders, will attend a refresher training every 4 years
- 5 Any church-organised transport of children or vulnerable adults will be checked to ensure the vehicle is suitable and insured and that the driver and escort are appropriate. An agreed record kept in the church file for each driver/car
- 6 Promotion of safeguarding is recognized to include undertaking those tasks which enable all God's people to reach their full potential. The Church Council will actively consider the extent to which it is succeeding in this area.

c) Appointment and training of workers

Workers will be appointed after a clear DBS check. Each worker will be expected to undergo basic safeguarding training, within the first year of appointment. The other training needs of each worker will be considered (e.g. food hygiene, first aid, lifting and handling, etc.) and each worker will have an annual review conducted by a named member of the Church Council and another worker within the organisation.

d) Pastoral visitors

In terms of safeguarding, Pastoral Visitors will be supported in their role with the provision of basic safeguarding training upon appointment.

e) Guidelines for working with children, young people and vulnerable adults

A leaflet will be produced and reviewed annually to be given to each worker with children, young people and vulnerable adults outlining good practice and systems. The leaflet will be reviewed annually with this policy. (Church Council may produce their own material or use appropriate Connexional leaflets) (*Quick Reference Guide and Code of Safer Working Practice Leaflet*).

f) Ecumenical events

Where ecumenical events happen on church premises, safeguarding is the responsibility of this Church Council. All united church events in partnership with Church of England Parish of Roundhay St John's, under the name, Oakwood Church, are referred to in this clause.

Roundhay St John agreed at their PCC meeting on 3rd March 2015 that they agree to follow the Roundhay Methodist Church safeguarding policy.

g) Events with church groups off the premises

Adequate staffing, a risk assessment and notification of the event to be given to the Church Safeguarding Officer PRIOR to the agreement for any event or off site activity. Notification of the event will be given to Anne Kirkland.

The Church Safeguarding Officer will forward it immediately to the Circuit Safeguarding Officer in order that an appropriate response can be made. The District Safeguarding Officer and District Safeguarding group will need to be informed of ALL off-site events.

h) Other groups on church premises

Where the building is hired for outside use, the person signing the letting agreement, which should include Safeguarding Form E, will be given a copy of this policy and the leaflet. The lettings secretary will consider the various users of the building in making lettings. All lettings will be notified to the Church Safeguarding Officer who will keep the records and take advice as appropriate from both the DSO and CSO

i) Complaints procedure

It is hoped that complaints can generally be dealt with internally by the organisations. However, a complaint maybe made to a person who will be appointed by the Church Council and who is currently the presbyter.

If a complaint is made to another person, it should be passed to the presbyter. who will arrange to meet with the complainant and attempt to resolve the complaint. If the complaint cannot be resolved, consideration will be given to invoking the complaints system of the Methodist Church which will involve initially speaking with the Local Complaints Officer who is the Superintendent Minister.

j) Review

This policy will be reviewed annually by the Church Council. The date of the next review is December 2018.

k) Key concepts and definitions

- 1) Vulnerable Adults: any person aged 18 or over who, due to disability, mental function, age or illness or traumatic circumstances, may not be able to take care or protect themselves from harm or exploitation.
- 2) Safeguarding and protecting children or vulnerable adults from maltreatment; preventing impairment of their health and ensuring safe and effective care
- 3) Adult/child protection is a part of safeguarding and promoting welfare. This refers to the activity which is undertaken to protect children/specific adults who are suffering or are at risk of suffering significant harm, including neglect.
- 4) Abuse and neglect may occur in a family, in a community and in an institution. It may be perpetrated by a person or persons known to the child or vulnerable adult or by strangers; by an adult or by a child. It maybe an infliction of harm or a failure to prevent harm.
